Caregiving Across the Life Course in Rural and Urban Households in the North Central Region

This webinar introduces NCR-Stat: Caregiving Across the Life Course Survey, which is the second dataset of the North Central Region dataset program (NCR-Stat). The survey was developed by researchers from NCRCRD, The Ohio State University, National Farm Medicine Center, Penn State University, AARP, University of Minnesota, Purdue University, University of Rhode Island, and South Dakota State University.

The dataset focuses on child, adult, and elder caregiving as an integral part of household and community well-being. The survey aims to learn more about the individuals and families that provide care and how caregiving affects community and economic development in rural and urban communities across the North Central Region.




SURVEY METHODOLOGY

- Mailed self-administered questionnaires in spring (March/April) to ...
 - Sample includes 7,000 randomly selected rural households in 86 counties
 - 18% Response rate in 2023 (1,100 responses)
 - Margin of error ±3%
- Procedure (Total Design Method)
 - 1. A pre-notification letter was sent requesting participation in the study and gives link to online survey.
 - 2. The questionnaire was mailed with an informal letter signed by the project manager approximately ten days later.
 - 3. A reminder postcard was sent to those who had not yet responded approximately ten days after the questionnaire had been sent.
 - 4. Those who had not yet responded within approximately 20 days of the original mailing were sent a replacement questionnaire.






Well-Being Compared to Five Years Ago: 1996 - 2023







Rural Confidence in Institutions 2017 & 2021






2021 provided the opportunity to collect data from both rural and metro respondents


Metro and Rural Trust Health Organizations to Provide Reliable Information on Covid-19




Subgroup Comparison Opportunities

Expectations of Your Personal Financial Situation by Education Level




