Since 1972, the nation's four Regional Rural Development Centers (RRDC), have played a critical role in elevating rural America through research, Extension education, and outreach.

NCRCRD moved to West Lafayette, Indiana in 2020 when Purdue University became the Center's new host. Prior to this move, NCRCRD was hosted by Iowa State University from 1972-2009 and Michigan State University from 2009-2020.

Upon review, collaboration played an important part of our accomplishments this year. The Center had the honor of partnering with or supporting others on many unique projects. Some of the highlights include:

- NCRCRD worked with other institutions and our sister Regional Rural Development Centers to develop and conduct three surveys of regional interest.
- NCRCRD grant funding supported land-grant institutions in Minnesota to collaborate on implementing the FORWARD curricula.
- A new working group consisting of six NCR land-grant universities received funding from NCRCRD to explore power of place action within rural communities.
- An NCRCRD Fellow collaborated with the North Central Region Housing Working Group to develop a regional housing survey that will be conducted by the Center.
- The Center began a partnership with two federally funded programs to provide technical assistance to each.
- NCRCRD and several organizations from the North Central Region came together to lead a national effort to review and revise a set of impact indicators that serve to highlight the impact and public value of Extension's Community, Resource, and Economic Development (CRED) contributions.
- NCRCRD collaborated with Extension Disaster Education Network (EDEN) and USDA National Institute of Food & Agriculture (NIFA) to encourage greater participation and collaboration with and between 1994 land-grant colleges and universities.

Identical to the NCR-Stat: Caregiving Survey, NCRCRD conducted the **NER-Stat: Caregiving Survey** in 2023 in the Northeast Region for our sister center, the Northeast Regional Center for Rural Development (NERCRD) and published the dataset in 2024. *NER Caregiving Respondents: 4,480 (725 child caregivers, 714 adult caregivers, and 1,175 cared for both children and adults).*

Collaboration on Three New Regional Surveys

In addition to the new NER dataset, NCRCRD collaborated with the Southern Rural Development Center and Auburn University to develop the Baseline 2024 Survey which is built upon the NCRCRD's first survey, NCR-Stat: Baseline 2022.

The Baseline 2024 survey was conducted in the North Central, Northeast, and Southern Regions in 2024. The resulting three regional datasets, **NCR-Stat: Baseline 2024**, **NER-Stat: Baseline 2024**, and **SR-Stat: Baseline 2024** will be released in 2025.

2024 Grants and Fellowships Awarded

NCRCRD grant opportunities support new and ongoing regional research, extension, and integrated activities and enhance the ability of the North Central Region's (NCR) thirty-four land-grant institutions to positively influence the quality of life in the region's rural areas.

SIX GRANTS FUNDED IN 2024

4 Small Grants

Similar to years past, the four Small Grant projects funded in 2024 offer unique and creative approaches to address the region's rural challenges.

The funded projects seek to: Utilize generative AI to enhance rural healthcare; study and assess the social value and impact of rural business entities on their community's well-being; customize a curriculum to support rural gateway communities in developing an outdoor recreation sector; and evaluate and develop a sustainability plan for a burgeoning food distribution program.

1 Extension Collaboration & Implementation Grant

The Extension Collaboration and Implementation Grant is meant to incentivize the implementation of Extension programs available through any of the 34 land-grant institutions in the North Central Region (NCR), in another NCR state where the program is currently not being implemented.

In 2024, the University of Minnesota (UMN) Extension received funding for a project that supports a collaboration between all five land-grant institutions in Minnesota to implement the FORWARD curricula. The institutions are: UMN Extension, Red Lake Nation College, White Earth Tribal Community College, Leech Lake Tribal College, and Fond Du Lac Tribal and Community College.

1 Thematic Working Group

The Center funded its second North Central Region thematic, multi-state working group in 2024. The new Place Action Working Group seeks to harness the transformative power of place action within rural communities, to develop and sustain these systems for place action knowledge, and to establish a core community of practice. The collaborative effort of six land-grant universities in our region is led by Todd Barman, University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Sarah Kennedy's fellow project aims to transform the NCR-Stat: Caregiving survey data into action by using the survey's data as a foundation for researching,

developing, and piloting a toolkit of strategies for addressing early child care across NCR communities.

The project will also establish a model for communities of practice, collaborative learning, and knowledge-sharing among stakeholders throughout the region.

New Partnerships and Collaborations

Center Partners with Two Programs to Provide Technical Assistance

In 2024, NCRCRD was awarded two cooperative agreements that support initiatives of importance to our region and draws upon the Center's expertise.

New Beginnings for Tribal Students (NBTS)

Cooperative Agreement: \$500,000 / 2024-2029 Awarded by: USDA National Institute of Food and Agriculture (NIFA)

The USDA-NIFA program, New Beginnings for Tribal Students (NBTS), makes competitive grants to land-grant universities to provide identifiable support specifically targeted for Tribal students and their academic success. NBTS aims to help increase the retention and graduation rate of Tribal students attending 1994, 1862, and 1890 land-grant universities.

Over the next five years, NCRCRD will assist USDA-NIFA in identifying and assessing barriers by compiling and analyzing data that the NBTS project directors collect on the program's barriers in recruiting and retaining students, and other factors contributing to student success. In addition, NCRCRD will collect programmatic data to ensure Congressional objectives for NBTS are being met and provide recommendations to overcome identified barriers.

PROPEL Technical Assistance Initiative

Cooperative Agreement: \$600,000 / 2024-2026 Awarded by: Delta Regional Authority (DRA)

The Delta Regional Authority (DRA), a federal regional commission promoting economic development with an eightstate service region across the lower Mississippi River Delta and Alabama Black Belt regions, has partnered with NCRCRD on the PROPEL Technical Assistance Initiative.

The PROPEL Initiative aims to enhance economic development and community resilience by providing targeted support and resources to economically distressed communities in their service region. During NCRCRD's three-year commitment, the Center will assist five communities in Missouri and Illinois to increase their community capacity and help them alleviate challenges around issues such as public infrastructure and business development. The Southern Rural Development Center also partnered with the DRA to provide similar support to communities in Kentucky, Louisiana, and Mississippi.

Susan Odum, Community and Economic Development Specialist, University of Illinois Extension, is NCRCRD's community coordinator for this grant.

Collaborative Effort to Review CRED Impact Indicators

In the first half of 2024 the North Central Region led an effort to review, refresh, and revise a set of impact indicators that serve as the foundation for highlighting the impact and public value of Extension's Community, Resource, and Economic Development (CRED) work nationally.

With the support of the North Central Cooperative Extension Association, the Southern Rural Development Center (SRDC), and the North Central Regional Center for Rural Development (NCRCRD), a plan for reviewing the indicators on a national level began in April 2024 with a national survey and webinar.

Following these initial efforts, Community Development Extension representatives from across the United States came together May 13-14, 2024, for the Community Development Extension Impact Indicators Retreat at the Red Lake Nation College site in Minneapolis, Minnesota. This retreat aimed to create new and improved ways for 1862, 1890, and 1994 landgrant institutions to expand the reach of their impact stories in inclusive and culturally relevant ways. A post-Impact Retreat survey was conducted by NCRCRD and SRDC to provide a venue for additional input on the proposed indicators. Michael Wilcox, NCRCRD and Purdue Extension, Anne Silvis, University of Illinois Extension, and Stacey McCullough, University of Arkansas Extension, shared all the findings gathered from this endeavor during the National Community Development Program Leaders meeting at the 2024 NACDEP Conference on June 17 in Houston, Texas.

Once agreed and finalized, the group will share the new quantitative and qualitative indicators and work toward their adoption across the country.

The first use of the revised Impact Indicators will be in the North Central Region Community Development 2024 Impact Report (available June 2025). The NCR is inviting program leaders to report on either the old or the new indicators in order to gradually incorporate them into use.

NCRCRD Collaborates with EDEN and NIFA on 2024 Workshops and Supports NCR Attendees with Travel Stipends

In June 2024, the Extension Disaster Education Network (EDEN) and the National Institute of Food & Agriculture (NIFA) held concurrent workshops with the shared goal of encouraging greater participation and collaboration with and between 1994 land-grant institutions (LGIs).

Members of the EDEN Executive Committee and FADI-EDEN partnership held a two-day meeting with invitees from 1994 LGIs from the North Central and Western Regions, to allow both EDEN and Tribal colleges to co-learn about each other and develop partnerships to address the emergency disaster education needs of Tribal colleges and the communities they serve. Meanwhile, the NIFA workshop, Grant Development and Grant Management Training for 1994 Universities, covered grant management and focused on developing opportunities and partnerships between the Tribal Colleges and NIFA.

Seeing the synergy of the two events, NCRCRD sought to support these efforts by helping to coordinate the workshops so that they would be held consecutively at the same location — Salish Kootenai College in Pablo, Montana — and offered travel stipends to North Central Region 1994 LGIs to encourage attendance. Overall, NCRCRD awarded six travel stipends.





Assessing Social Value of Nebraska Livestock Sale Barns to Assist with Community Well-Being and Resiliency

Principal Investigator: Marilyn Schlake Organization: University of Nebraska-Lincoln State: Nebraska

Project Abstract:

Globally, research on social value measurement of economic entities is evolving in relationship to individuals and community. This growing field explores community social capital through the lens of social value, or how social connections translate into actions with tangible outcomes impacting individual livelihoods and community well-being. This project seeks to apply and modify the framework of an Australian research study to Nebraska livestock sale barns, which is a significant rural economic entity. The team will use a mixed-method study to identify the sale barns' social value and explore implications for individual and community well-being and resiliency. These findings can help establish the value of rural business entities or organizations beyond the traditional economic focus. Research findings will also help identify the social connections that enhance belongingness and connectivity and provide potential avenues for enhancing Extension program delivery.

In Pursuit of Place: Developing Resilient and Meaningful Communities

Principal Investigator: Todd Barman Organization: University of Wisconsin-Madison State: Multiple

Project Abstract:

Our proposal seeks to harness the transformative power of place action within rural communities, aligning with the NCRCRD's mission to foster resilient communities and economies, leadership and civic engagement, and community health and wellness. We utilize the term place action – action to purposefully increase the likelihood people will connect positively with a place and with each other – to capture the numerous types of community planning and design activities associated with place. Because inclusive place action can drive healthy community, demographics, and climate change, support from NCRCRD can be leveraged to attract additional resources.

The goal of this collaborative effort is to develop and sustain systems and routines for culling, creating, accessing, training, and applying place and place action knowledge for applied practitioners and professionals working with rural communities. This effort will be unique in its attempt to bridge the gaps and identify the overlaps within the place action realms of place knowing, place keeping, placemaking, and place management, as well as the placemaking realms of tactical, creative, strategic, cultural and community placemaking. There are two primary audiences: a community of practice/science (academicians and practitioners) and a community of communities (local change agents). As part of a broader plan to develop and sustain these systems for place action knowledge, this proposal pursues the establishment of a core community of practice through monthly meetings, the launch of an inaugural summit, the development of a virtual repository, and the development and publication of new scholarship to represent the full range of place action.

Six land-grant institutions in the region have confirmed their commitment to working together on this proposed place action working group. They include Michigan State University, Purdue University, University of Minnesota, University of Missouri, University of Nebraska-Lincoln, and University of Wisconsin.

Satellite-based Automated Data Collection and Visualization for Mobile Home Park Analysis Using Computer Vision

Fellow: Armin Yeganeh, Ph.D., Assistant Professor, School of Planning, Design and Construction, Michigan State University

Project Goals:

- To develop an AI-driven methodology for automatically gathering reliable data on Manufactured Housing Communities (MHCs).
- To apply the methodology to detect MHCs in the North Central Region and create a publicly accessible database and GIS map resource.
- To demonstrate the findings through a case study that identifies and examines the socioeconomic drivers behind the growth and decline of MHCs.

Project Accomplishments:

- A robust methodology (code) for the automated collection of accurate data on Manufactured Housing Communities (MHCs). The methodology manuscript is under review in *Scientific Data*, a journal published by Nature Research.
- A publicly available database and GIS map resource that provides reliable information on MHCs in the North Central Region.
- A case study exploring the socioeconomic factors influencing the growth and decline of MHCs. The case study manuscript is under review in *Journal of Housing Policy Debate*.

Training Provided:

- Training in Advanced Data Collection Techniques: Students and staff developed expertise in computer programming for high-resolution aerial imagery analysis and computer vision techniques.
- GIS and Spatial Data Analysis: Students gained hands-on experience with Geographic Information Systems (GIS), geospatial datasets, and mapping tools.
- Socioeconomic Research and Data Integration: Students and staff have had the chance to join socioeconomic data from various sources, such as historical imagery, government data, and Census Bureau surveys.
- Project Management and Collaboration: As this is a multidisciplinary project involving data science, socioeconomic research, and urban planning, students and staff have had the opportunity to develop collaborative project management skills.
- Following this project, the PI has prepared and submitted an NSF grant to further explore the topic.

Dissemination of Findings:

- PI presented results to: 1) the Community and Economic Development group at Iowa State University and 2) the School of Planning, Design, and Construction at Michigan State University.

Impact:

The study/project on Manufactured Housing Communities (MHCs) has several significant impacts:

- *Improved Data Availability:* By creating a publicly accessible database and GIS map resource, the project addresses a major gap in systematically collected data on MHCs. This provides researchers, policymakers, and planners with reliable information to better understand these communities and develop targeted interventions.
- Enhanced Understanding of Affordable Housing: MHCs are a critical source of affordable housing for low-income households in the U.S. The study's insights into the physical and socioeconomic factors influencing MHC growth and decline will inform housing policy decisions aimed at preserving and improving this vital housing stock.
- Advancements in Technology-Driven Housing Research: Leveraging computer vision techniques and highresolution aerial imagery, the project showcases innovative methods for detecting and mapping MHCs. This approach can be applied to other types of housing or infrastructure studies, promoting broader use of AI and geospatial analysis in urban planning and real estate research.
- *Educational and Professional Development:* The project offered students and staff opportunities to develop valuable skills in AI, geospatial analysis, and socioeconomic research, contributing to workforce development in fields like urban planning, data science, and housing policy.
- Influence on Regional and National Housing Strategies: The findings from the study could influence strategies not only in the North Central Region but also at the national level, shaping policies that respond to the challenges and opportunities associated with MHCs across the country.

Leadership Chautauqua: Utilizing Peer Learning Networks to Revolutionize Extension's Approach to Community Leadership Development Systems

Principal Investigator:

Lindsay Hastings, University of Nebraska-Lincoln

Project Goals:

The goal of the Leadership Chautauqua approach was to take the community leadership movement to the next level in three ways: (a) bringing together diverse partners to move the needle on building a strong leadership infrastructure to support rural America in addressing today's challenges; (b) addressing the underlying community systems to encourage sustainable approaches with the capacity to spiral up both the quality and quantity of leaders, and (c) understanding the role of leaders in identifying, accessing, and mobilizing both community assets and leaders' gifts to generate a prosperous future for all.

Objectives

- 1. Engage scholars and practitioners in the leadership field to perform a needs assessment in preparation for the Chautauqua.
- 2. Design a systems-based approach to creating community leadership development systems using a participatory process engaging peer networks of community leaders throughout the North Central Region.

Project Accomplishments:

- Developed a network map of existing leadership programs and contacts.
- Created an asset mapping process and map to guide assessment conversations around existing leadership resources and structures during the Chautauqua. Identified people who manage, support, and provide training for community leadership programs, as well as participant of these leadership programs, providing a core of invited participants for the Chautauqua.
- Hosted Leadership Chautauqua on November 8, 2023 in Kearney, NE and brought together over 100 thought leaders, practitioners, and community leaders from across the North Central Region to engage in dialogue, asset and network mapping, and workgroup planning. This effort also resulted in the development of both informal and formal peer learning networks. The Chautauqua provided the pathway to a more in-depth understanding of the factors that trend positively over time with successful community leadership as well as the invisible structures that facilitate community leadership development (CLD) and succession.
- The Chautauqua findings served as a bridge into the more comprehensive research planned within a NIFA grant project by developing a stronger basis for the measures of antecedents of community change and fostering relationships for further research and piloting.

- Spring 2024: Hosted three online peer learning sessions for leaders statewide. Thematic insights from the Chautauqua event that were confirmed in the peer learning sessions included (a) encouraging collective leadership, (b) addressing the 'Who's Missing?' question, and (c) promoting organizational and regional partnerships.
- Hosted a three-session "Lead & Succeed Lunchbox Series" in the summer of 2024 to dive into each topic with local leaders. Community stakeholders also explored possibilities to strengthen how the university could provide technical assistance to enhance collaborative community leadership.

Training Provided: Professional development opportunity for students and staff in group facilitation techniques.

Dissemination of Findings:

- Rural Prosperity Nebraska communications staff within the University of Nebraska-Lincoln created and distributed news stories on the Chautauqua that highlighted its results.
- We presented about Chautauqua at several conferences: International Association of Public Participation, Community Development Society, Association of Leadership Educators, and International Leadership Association.
- Presented talks for Rural Rendezvous and Connecting Entrepreneurial Communities events in Nebraska.

Impact: As a result of the Leadership Chautauqua work, we have seen and developed opportunities to revolutionize Extension's approach to community leadership development – incorporating existing leader development resources into a larger systemic approach to support strong rural community leadership systems capable of addressing challenges impacting the well-being and prosperity of rural communities. In-depth understanding of factors that trend positively over time with successful community leadership systems as well as the invisible structures that facilitate CLD and succession have improved precision regarding the study of leadership in community contexts, improved CLD programming approaches for effective community leadership transfer, and have offered pathways for centering equity in community leadership structures.

Partners In Produce – A Food Distribution Project in East Central Illinois

Principal Investigator: Krystal Hodge, University of Illinois State: Illinois

Project Abstract:

Food insecurity affects over 1 in 7 people in Coles County, Illinois. The University of Illinois Extension builds partnerships with local organizations to address food insecurity. One such collaboration, Partners in Produce, distributed over 100,000 pounds of produce to East Central Illinois residents in 2023. Program challenges remain regarding produce delivery and sustainability, and the impact of these efforts on dietary intake and food insecurity among residents is unknown. This project will support Partners in Produce through produce delivery in Summer 2024, outcome evaluation, and development of a sustainability plan for 2025 involving collaboration from partner agencies.

Produce purchases and delivery will be tracked to evaluate produce distribution. Participants will be recruited (n=100) to assess the impact on dietary intake and food security. Participants (n=29) will be recruited to participate in a workshop led by Extension staff to develop a plan for pick up and/or delivery of produce and opportunities to share resources to ensure that produce is available for all food pantries that would like to receive it. A diverse audience will be recruited to evaluate the impact of the efforts. The results will inform future years of program implementation.

Enhancing Rural Healthcare by Incorporating Generative AI and Machine Learning: Building Stronger Communication Networks

Principal Investigator: Richard Johnson-Sheehan, Purdue University Co-Principal Investigator: Thomas Rickert, University of Nebraska-Lincoln Extension State: Indiana and Nebraska

Project Abstract:

This project addresses the challenges faced by rural healthcare clinics in North Central United States, particularly in Indiana, where geographic isolation, financial constraints, and limited resources lead to healthcare disparities. These clinics struggle with inefficient communication networks, outdated record keeping, and a lack of specialized resources. Our aim is to develop strategies in which land-grant universities use generative artificial intelligence and machine learning to enhance rural development by improving healthcare communications.

This approach will streamline administrative tasks, improve patient data management, facilitate remote consultations, and enable predictive healthcare management. The project involves three phases: assessing current communication practices, developing AI methods to strengthen these practices, and educating healthcare professionals on using AI tools. Ultimately, this initiative will enhance rural healthcare delivery, reduce the strain on healthcare professionals, and improve the quality of life for rural residents, showcasing the role of land-grant institutions in rural healthcare advancement.

NCR SMALL GRANT

Rural Family Caregiving: Building Selfcare and Resiliency of Rural Women Family Caregivers for Older Adults

Principal Investigators: Nasreen Lalani, Purdue University

Project Goals: Conduct study to determine the selfcare needs and practices of rural female caregivers and its association with resilience and wellbeing.

Project Accomplishments:

- Conducted study and analyzed results: Using a mixed method approach, our study surveyed (N=100) rural female caregivers followed by qualitative interviews in two rural counties of Indiana.

Emergency Preparedness for Rural Families

Principal Investigator: Jenna Nees, Purdue University Co-Principal Investigator: Ann Kline, University of Nebraska

Project Goals:

- 1. Develop a 4-session workshop series that focused on farm emergency management, first aid, fire protection, and HAZMAT on the farm.
- 2. Utilize the curriculum developed for the 4-session workshop series on a local basis to additional audiences proving that the curriculum can be repeated in the future.
- 3. Develop and implement an evaluation that could be utilized for both the larger program series and the shorter sessions that were delivered.
- 4. Utilize the information shared in the program to write an article that would share the information with a larger audience.

Project Accomplishments:

- Developed a curriculum (lectures and hands-on activities) for the 4-session workshop, *Emergency Preparedness for Rural Families*.
- Presented 4-session workshop: 27 people attended the 4-session workshop that was offered in-person and virtually to audiences in Indiana and Nebraska.

Participant surveys (n=14) were gathered and analyzed. Results indicated 29% (n=14) of participants had a better understanding of emergency preparedness. Likewise, 23% stated they had new resources to help them make decisions, while 20% stated they were more confident in their ability to make a decision related to emergency preparedness. Twentynine percent (n=14) of the participants planned to develop an emergency preparedness plan, while 42% planned to adopt or implement one thing they learned from the workshop series. Forty percent (n=14) of participants estimated that this program had a financial impact on their farming operation of greater than \$10 per acre.

- Hosted two additional educational sessions.
 - <u>Session 1</u>: "First Aid on the Farm" at the Northeast Purdue Ag Center Field Day featured the curriculum from the first aid portion of the larger workshop series. The session drew 101 participants.

Participant surveys (n=79) were gathered and analyzed. Results indicated 85% (n=79) of participants had a better understanding of first aid. Likewise, 42% stated they had new resources to help them make decisions, while 52% stated they were more confident in their ability to make a decision related to emergency preparedness. Thirty-seven percent (n=79) of the participants planned to develop a plan to address first aid, while 64% planned to adopt or implement one thing they learned from the workshop series. Additionally, 97% (n=79) felt they were more comfortable using tourniquet and bleeding control as a result of the program; 94% said they were more comfortable recognizing a medical emergency; and 86% said they were more comfortable using 911 and backups.

- <u>Session 2</u>: Forty participants learned about fire protection during a Private Applicator Recertification Program in Clay County, Indiana. This session featured curriculum from the fire protection portion of the larger workshop series. Evaluation results from this program included 60% of the individuals (n=15) learned something they didn't know before. Similarly, 87% (n=15) said they either agree or strongly agree that they learned a new skill related to fire protection.
- Evaluation tools were developed and implemented at each of the programs as indicated above.
- One newspaper article was written and appeared in *The Banner Graphic, Morning Ag Clips*, and on the Purdue Extension – Putnam County website. This article focused on developing an initial farm emergency plan.

Extension staff in Indiana and Nebraska were invited to participate in the 4-session workshop. Seven staff members participated.

Dissemination of Findings:

A report of the impact of this program was provided to the Purdue Extension Leadership Team and local Purdue Extension Boards. Plans are in place to use the idea of rural preparedness in future Purdue Extension programming.

 - b. Research and develop survey questions;

- 3. Visit and collaborate with the NCRCRD at Purdue University.

Project Accomplishments:

- 1. Provided names of potential advisory individuals based on professional networks and review of the literature.
- 2. Participated in defining the objectives and scope of the survey through one-on-one meetings and emails with project lead, Dr. Shoshanah Inwood and larger team meetings. Also, I shared the bank of survey questions I had developed while working on a survey on childcare for farm families (CDCNIOSH project). The bank included 78 questions and these were a mix of questions from 12 existing survey instruments and questions that I developed.
- 3. Provided written and oral feedback on several iterations of the survey instruments.
- 4. Dataset published.
